social work represents -- service.


Service is a persistent and

# Georgia Gateway Training for Child Welfare Staff

Georgia Gateway implementation is underway. We have already trained staff for the Pilot and are preparing for Wave 1 training. An identified number of Social Services

staff will attend Georgia Gateway training in the classroom. These staff have been notified and will be registered directly by the SS Registrar.

All other Social Services staff who will have screening duties in Georgia Gateway are to complete the online training for Georgia Gateway. Any other Social Services or agency staff may also complete this training as desired. The training sequence is online and can be accessed at <a href="https://www.iotis.org">www.iotis.org</a>. It includes Web Based Training Modules and Webinar Recordings.

- Web Based Trainings: Georgia Gateway online prerequisite (GA 050) course consists of 6 modules that provide a basic overview of the Georgia Gateway System and Navigation.
- Webinar Recordings: The Webinar Recordings are video recordings of the Georgia Gateway system. The trainer navigates various features and functions of the system and discusses relevant features and functions. The webinars are divided into three parts:
- o **Part 1:** The first recording discusses the search/inquiry features and functions of the Georgia Gateway system. It also reviews basic system terminology. This recording is approximately 25 minutes long.
- o **Part 2:** The second recording outlines how to find information within the Data Collection module in Georgia Gateway. It also discusses how to find eligibility information. This recording is approximately 35 minutes long.
- o **Part 3:** The third recording describes how to use additional system features such as alerts, tasks and case notes. This recording is approximately 35 minutes long.

#### To access the training:

- 1) Log into www.gadfcs.org
- 2) Select Online Training Courses
- 3) Select the yellow Georgia Gateway Courses button
- 4) Select Georgia Gateway Prerequisite (Non-Classroom)

Also available are 'Did You Know Videos' which are optional for Social Services Staff. These videos are short in length and provide a general overview of Georgia Gateway. This includes information on the Go Live Approach, Basic Processing, and Training and Support being offered throughout implementation.

The videos are under the OFI Georgia Gateway Training section and can are accessible via the following steps:

- 1) Log into <u>www.gadfcs.org</u>.
- 2) Select Online Training Courses.
- 3) If you see a screen that asks you to choose between OFI and SS, choose OFI. If you don't see that screen, you can still switch over to the OFI course selection by clicking the "OFI" link located in the gray line near the bottom of the browser window.

- 4) Select the yellow Georgia Gateway Courses button5) Select GA 050: Georgia Gateway Prerequisite. 'The Did You Know' videos are in this course.
